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**SHELBY COUNTY MAYOR LEE HARRIS ANNOUNCES COUNTY'S FIRST ARTS
AND CULTURE LIAISON**

In this new role for Shelby County Government, Nykesha Cole will work alongside nonprofit leaders to bring the arts community and government together to invest in our creative economy.



Shelby County, TN – Shelby County Mayor Lee Harris announces that Nykesha Cole, an experienced non-profit agency leader, has been named the first-ever arts and culture liaison for Shelby County Government. In this role, Cole will be responsible for fostering relationships with local arts and cultural organizations and county government. In addition, Cole will help develop new systems that expand the impact of arts and culture organizations within Shelby County.

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Shelby County's first arts and culture liaison is a policy suggestion of the Shelby County Nonprofit Committee. Mayor Harris established the committee last year to bring together representatives from over 150 nonprofit organizations to establish a committee that would strategically align the work they do, identify barriers by providing services, and formulate concrete solutions to problems. Its four subcommittees include Children, Youth, and Education; Health and Human Services; Workforce Development; and Arts and Culture.

Cole most recently served as the executive director of Mustard Seed, Inc., a social services nonprofit organization. She has an extensive background in the nonprofit and public sectors including the One Step Initiative, the Memphis and Shelby County Division of Planning and Development, and the Greater Memphis Chamber.

Cole holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Journalism from Southern Methodist University and is a candidate for a Master's Degree in Public Service from the University of Arkansas Clinton School of Public Service. She has extensive volunteer experience with arts organizations and is passionate about their importance to all residents of Shelby County.
