(SCRANTON, PA) – Members of the community are invited to plant mums in the Downtown Scranton Business District on Sunday, September 16, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. No prior gardening experience is required, as volunteers will be paired with a master gardener and provided with all the supplies needed for a successful planting.

Scranton Tomorrow will host the event in partnership with Penn State Master Gardeners in Lackawanna County and community volunteers. Sunday's planting marks the installation of 64 new planters with vibrant fall mums.

Anyone interested in volunteering should meet the group under the white tent on the corner of Linden Street and N. Washington Avenue on Sunday, September 16, at 11 a.m. The plantings will continue until 2 p.m., rain or shine.
