A LITERARY TREASURE TROVE

In honor of Read Across America Day, Random House Children's Books donated more than 850 books to The Preuss School to expand the home libraries for all scholars. Each collection included an age-appropriate book that students can read now, a higher reading level book that students can aspire to read, as well as a children's book that students can share with younger readers in their family.

"Thanks to this generous donation from Dr. Seuss Enterprises and Random

House, our scholars will have the opportunity to strengthen their literacy skills, explore topics of diversity and foster intergenerational reading with family and community members. This is a transformational experience," said Dr. Helen V. Griffith.

The books were distributed by The Preuss School's Scholar Support Mobile, organized and led by librarians Karen Nance and Maria Gonzalez. The library-on-wheels offers scholars a chance to pick up and return physical library books and textbooks as well as art, engineering and music supplies in a community near them.

#1 IN SAN DIEGO



U.S. News & World Report recently named The Preuss School UC San Diego the #1 high school in San Diego County in their 2021 list of Best High Schools. The ranking also placed The Preuss School #6 in California among 2,598 schools and #76 nationally among 17,857 schools across the U.S.

In addition, the California Department of Education recognized The Preuss School as a 2021 California Distinguished School. "These schools are great examples of California's commitment to provide outstanding public education for all students, and their data-driven efforts have helped ensure that their students leave with the tools and skills they need to be successful after graduation," said State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond.

CLASS OF 2021 A MODEL OF RESILIENCE

The Preuss School's Class of 2021 spent their entire senior year learning remotely. Despite the challenges of missing friends, digital fatigue and transitioning events and clubs online, scholars sustained their academic excellence. Among 108 seniors, 96 percent were accepted to at least one four-year college or university, while a record 52 were accepted to UC San Diego. The entire cohort will be the first in their family to graduate from college.

The senior class amassed more than \$3 million dollars in scholarships and grants, including Christopher Santiago, who will move to Connecticut this fall to attend Yale University with a full scholarship. He plans to study astrophysics and one day become an astronaut.

"Preuss definitely set me up for success; it taught me the value of routine, the need for rigor, and overall, the need to be proud," said Santiago. "It had been seven long years and it just does not seem real to be ending it all within a few months. I am excited to start a new chapter, and nervous to move across the country."

Scholars were celebrated at an in-person commencement ceremony on June 17 at Manchester Field on The Preuss School campus. The event featured remarks from school leadership, faculty, students and a pre-recorded keynote address by California Secretary of State Dr. Shirley Weber.

"You have thrived as the only Preuss senior class to complete your last year of high school in a worldwide pandemic—rallying for justice with Black Lives Matter, standing against Asian Hate—and you have become socially conscious in a way that will change our world," said Dr. Helen V. Griffith at commencement.

Commencement is always a special day, but our June 17 ceremony held so much more meaning than ever before. After 15 months of being separated by a computer screen, the Class of 2021 had the chance to reunite in person before beginning their journey to college.

I am so proud of our graduates, whose perseverance has secured them a position at prestigious universities across the nation, from UC San Diego to Princeton and Yale. The entire class will be the first in their family to graduate from college—an accomplishment we prepare them to meet from the first day they arrive at The Preuss School.

And their dreams are big. Vyvy Nguyen '21 plans to attend UCLA in the fall to become an OB-GYN doctor so that she can empower and support women throughout their pregnancies.

Alexis Barajas '21 will attend UC San Diego to study cognitive psychology. Her goal is to become a clinical psychologist to serve hospitalized children, motivated by her own

brother's experience working with a speech and physical therapist.

As we congratulate our seniors, we have also developed opportunities for our continuing students to gain experience that will propel them as outstanding college candidates. We welcomed 150 scholars in grades six through 12 to our summer academy, which was hosted in partnership with UC San Diego Athletics, the Reuben H. Fleet Science Center and The Birch Aquarium at Scripps Institution of Oceanography. Scholars were able to engage in online learning with faculty, paraeducators and tutors as well as take part in athletic games and science camps led by The Fleet and Birch Aquarium.

In addition, scholars had the chance to work with professionals and learn about the fundamentals of business ownership through the Start R Teen program at UC San Diego's Rady School of Management. Scholars created a business plan and pitched their bright ideas to industry representatives, as well as toured a business incubator nearby.

Summer also presented an opportunity for our high schoolers to enroll in free undergraduate courses at UC San Diego thanks to a grant provided by the UC San Diego Summer School Office. The courses they complete will be added to their high

school transcript, given weighted credit and are completely transferrable to any college or university. Through our unique connection to the university, we are preparing our scholars to thrive once they reach higher education and beyond.

As we begin the new academic year, we are continuing to be vigilant about safety during the ongoing coronavirus pandemic. Between April and July, The Preuss School hosted five vaccination clinics where more than 1,000 vaccines were administered to scholars and their families, as well as community members living in the hardest hit areas of San Diego. We have resumed in-person instruction, beginning in August, with enhanced safety measures.

It is always a bittersweet moment to bid farewell to our graduating class. I have no doubt that these exceptional individuals will make a difference in their chosen field, and within their communities. I can't wait to see the great changes they will inspire.

TECH TALKS WITH INDUSTRY EXPERTS

What types of careers will be available in the technology industry over the next 20 years? A new professional lecture series was launched at The Preuss School in fall 2020 to introduce scholars to professionals who could share insights about their work and the path to their career.

Sachin Deshpande, senior director at Qualcomm Ventures and volunteer at The Preuss School, was instrumental in creating the program with Tamika Franklin, former director of development for The Preuss School. Deshpande said, "I thought to myself a lot of high school students were probably down during the pandemic. Why not give a little hope and share opportunities in new technology industries?"

Whereas some scholars may be intimidated by the prospect, Deshpande wanted to dispel myths about barriers to entering the industry. "When people hear technology, they think that it is only engineering jobs. But there are other related technology careers in finance, marketing and project management, which are great paths too."

The first professional lecture series was held in October and focused on "Careers in the High Technology Sector." Deshpande moderated the one-hour program, where scholars could learn more and ask questions to the head of communications at Zoom, the senior eCommerce strategist at Salesforce.com and the co-founder of Unleash AI Fund.

The monthly events are open to 10th and 11th grade scholars and were presented virtually on Zoom. So far, a total of 20 lectures have been held, including a conversation with Summer Stephan, district attorney of San Diego; Rob Vazquez, chief operating officer of the Energy Group at General Atomics; Javi Grillo Marxuach, television screenwriter and producer; and David Artis, dean of undergraduate research advancement at UC San Diego.

Deshpande's next idea? "It would be great to be able to offer interactive office hours once a month or every quarter with industry experts from San Diego and across the globe."



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
