



Jacumba Hot Springs will soon be home to San Diego County's largest solar farm. Residents aren't happy.



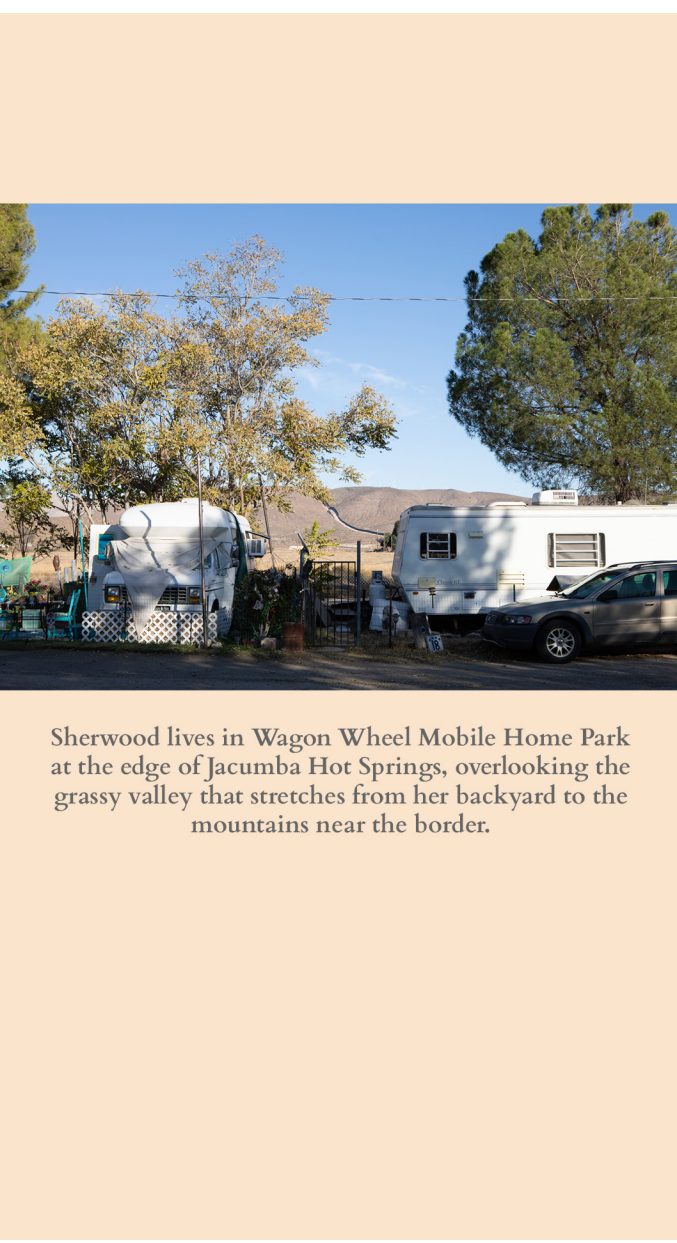
Diana Sherwood is one of the residents who opposes the solar project so near the town. She's a retired caregiver who's resided in Jacumba Hot Springs for four years.



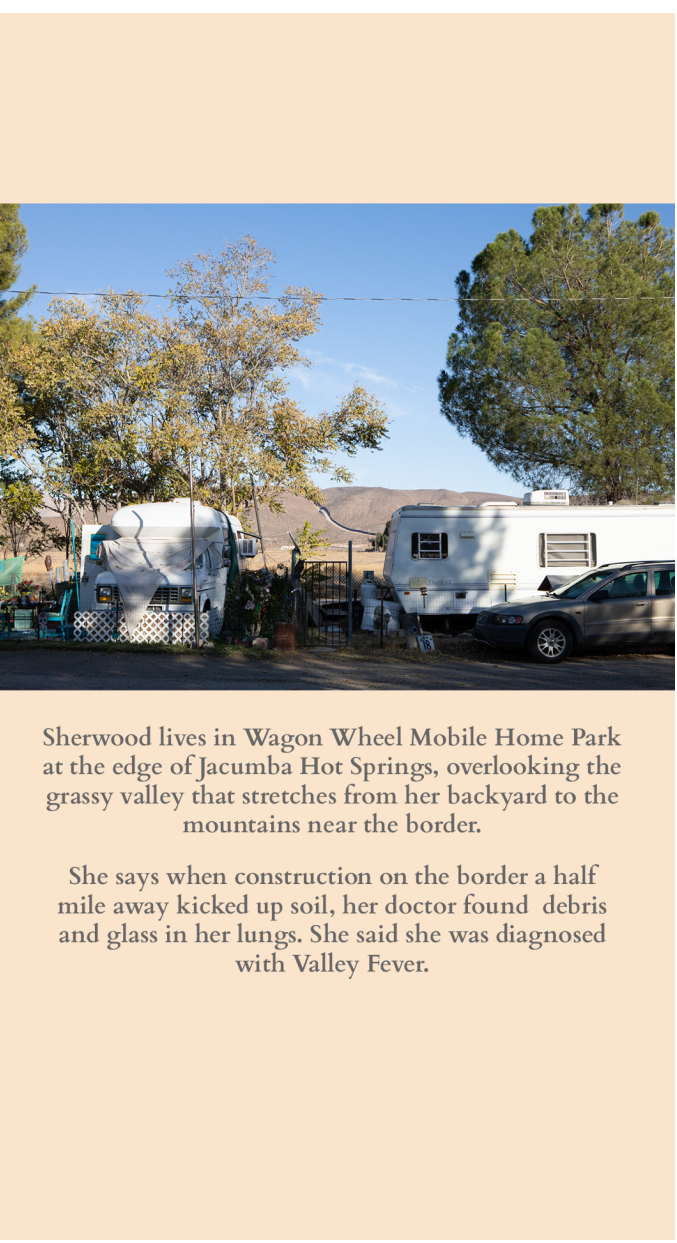
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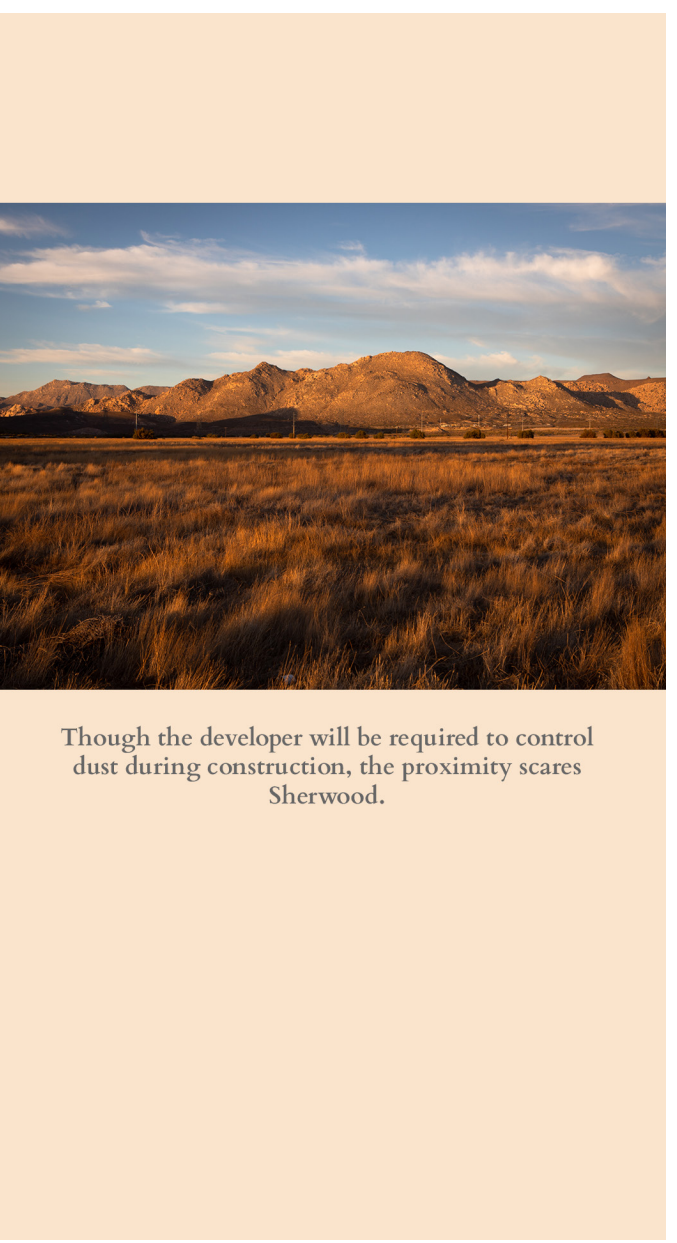

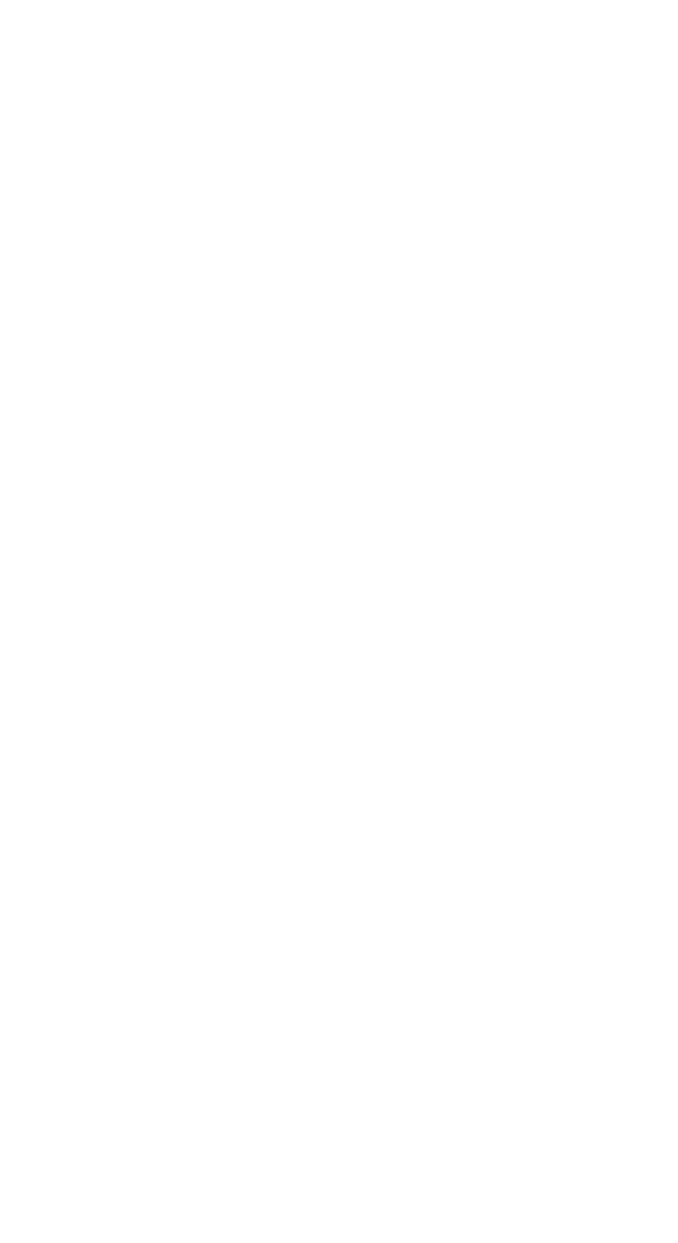
