Byford, Doak and Hutchings break down the conceptions of Russia as a discrete nation with a singular language, culture, and history.



[Transnational Russian Studies](#) comprises of nineteen original case studies from a variety of disciplinary approaches, ranging from literary analysis to musicology, all of which cover a broad historical span, from Russia's pre-modern origins through the nineteenth century, to the Soviet period and up to the present day.

The target audience for this volume is primarily students and researchers of Russian Studies. However, [Transnational Russian Studies](#) will also be relevant to all Modern Linguists, and to those who employ transnational paradigms within the broader humanities.

Overall, this transnational approach to Russian Studies generates new perspectives on the history of Russian culture and Russia's role as a multinational society that has perpetually redefined Russianness in reaction to the wider world.
